

NEW ERA FOR ST MARY'S

We are delighted to say that our wonderful, medieval church now has heating, new electrics, new lighting and a beautiful, level York stone floor in the North, South and South Outer Aisles and the Nave.

Importantly, St Mary's also has three new, additional toilets, one which is wheelchair accessible and the vestry toilet has been renewed. We also have a basic kitchen facility.

Although there is still some work to be completed, St Mary's was able to hold a Service of Rededication on Sunday, 25th September (see page 3). Our Sunday 11am Sung Eucharist (BCP) has been held in church for much of this year, but on Friday, 4th November, our weekly Holy Communion Service (35 minutes) resumed too.

Thankfully, the soup kitchens at St Mary's, which take place on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, have been able to continue in the churchyard throughout the improvement works.

It has been a long and hard process, taking many years of fundraising and determination against the odds, but we have achieved significant change, which should give St Mary's a future.

Come and see for yourself! You will be very welcome.


CHORAL EVENSONG - SERVICE OF REDICATION

There are times when we wonder when we shall see completion but once the work is done the building is transformed and all the stress and frustration turns out to have been worthwhile.

In recent weeks I have been gratified by the number of people who have said how good St Mary's looks and feels now that we have new floors, kitchen and above all heating. We are very grateful to the Friends of St Mary's who have supported us through all the restoration planning and work resulting in the revived church building that we see today.

At the service remembering road accident victims someone said that St Mary's is a hidden gem in the centre of the city so that many who pass by do not realise that it is there. Our task now is to make St Mary's better known and used while retaining its unique position as an oasis of calm in the heart of the city. Although the current phase of work is complete, our renewed ministry to the Old Town and beyond is only just beginning. We look forward to welcoming you in 2023 and sharing in all that St Mary's can give to worshippers and visitors alike.

GRANT AND DONATIONS NEWS

Since the FoSM newsletter in November 2022, St Mary's has received more generous support.

An application to **The Sir James Reckitt Charity** for a centenary grant was successful in securing a total of £22,220 to fund a set of 30 Abbey chairs, which St Mary's will be able to arrange for concerts, workshops and for visitors to use to enjoy refreshments. Faculty permission was in place and the chairs have been ordered and are due to arrive in late January 2023. This generous sum is also enabling St Mary's to install an alarm in the wheelchair accessible WC and will fund essential drain works.

All at St Mary's extend their sincere thanks to the Trustees of the Charity.

The **East Yorkshire Georgian Society** has awarded St Mary's a grant of £3,927 towards conservation work required to the monument to Joseph Pease & Others (c.1778-1840). Joseph Pease founded a banking dynasty in Hull that was to last for several generations, although the family were also merchants with many other interests. The Pease Bank, established in 1754, was both Hull's and Yorkshire's very first bank.

St Mary's has also been successful in securing a very welcome second grant from the **Joseph Boaz Charitable Trust**. This grant of £500 has enabled St Mary's to purchase a fridge.

Also, **Myton Law** has kindly donated a full set of crockery, an electric kettle, toaster, microwave, water and wine glasses and jugs, catering flasks, cutlery, serving dishes and tea towels, so that St Mary's new kitchen facility is now equipped with a smart set of catering crockery etc for 30 people ready for events.

The St Mary's Project Group also applied to the **National Churches Trust** for a further Gateway Grant to support the cost of other drains work. In November we received the good news that the NCT has awarded a grant of £5,000, so that this work can proceed.

More support needed

Despite this tremendous support, St Mary's still faces a number of major projects in the next ten years.

The church architect estimates that St Mary's needs to raise another £810,000 for:

£519,000 - repairs to the tower parapet & pinnacles, North Nave clerestory, North Aisle roof, South Nave parapet pinnacles, doors and rainwater drainage and

£291,000 - second phase of internal improvements - creation of meeting area, completion of kitchen and servery and plaster repairs.

SOUP KITCHEN UPDATE

During 2022 both the *Hull Homeless Outreach* and *Reaching Out to the Homeless* teams have continued their wonderful work providing soup kitchens in St Mary's churchyard. They have had to contend with the work going on to improve the church, which has meant that parts of the churchyard have been occupied by building materials, but they have provided the usual brilliant and caring service to anyone in need.

Fridays	from 6pm-7pm


Karina for *Reaching Out to the Homeless*, said, "We are averaging between 40-50 people at the soup kitchen every Friday. Sadly, there seems to have been an increase since the cost of living crisis.

"We would always welcome any food donations as they would be useful in helping others. We are OK for volunteers.

"We are supported by YMSH who provide medical assistance when needed, so it would be nice to give a shout out to them as they provide this service not only to us but also to most of the soup kitchens around the city centre."

PUBLICATIONS



The East Yorkshire Family History Society has drawn our attention to their publication <u>Hull, St Mary's,</u> <u>Lowgate - Monumental Inscriptions</u>.

This 48-page booklet includes 361 monumental inscriptions found in St Mary's church, the churchyard and in the Trippett Street burial ground and an index for St Mary's and Cemetery listed alphabetically by name.

The list includes many notable names, including Blaydes, Dobson, Hildyard, Jarrett, Pease and Thornton and monuments dating back to 1655.

There is also a plan indicating the position of the monuments in the church and churchyard.

The inscriptions were recorded by Dave Mount and were typed up by Enid Walford in 2007 and subsequently reprinted in 2010 and 2016. Those for Trippett Street were recorded c.1949.

HULL CIVIC SOCIETY VISIT



Hull Civic Society paid St Mary's a visit on the evening of Monday, 26th September.

ST MARY'S TREES

For some years the size and height of St Mary's three London Plane trees in the churchyard has been a concern. Whilst the trees are beautiful, their height and canopy size have been causing problems with leaves blocking the church's gutters and making the churchyard slippery. Roosting birds have created dirt that is both slippery and a hygiene hazard and a number of limbs are too close to the church's pinnacles.

In 2019 Hull City Council, as St Mary's is a closed churchyard, assumed repairs and maintenance responsibility under Section 215 of the Local Government Act 1972.

Since then, the St Mary's Project Group has been pressing the Council to propose a plan for the trees that would help to address the issues in the churchyard.

In October this year the Council undertook some limb reduction and crown lifting work that has alleviated, but not fully addressed, the problems.


Following a meeting with ward Councillor Herrera-Richmond and representatives of the Council's Streetscene team in October, the Council has proposed further work to pollard the trees at seven metres. The Council's tree team advise that the resulting canopy regeneration will make the trees considerably more manageable for the future and increase their longevity in their confined location.

The trees fall within the city centre conservation area and the Council has applied to the Local Planning Authority for approval for the work. St Mary's has obtained the necessary List B approval for this work from the Diocese.

The Council has also asked its street cleansing team to sweep the churchyard once a week.

REMEMBRANCE SERVICE

For the first time since 2019, St Mary's was able to hold a Remembrance Service. On Sunday, 13th November, attendees gathered in the churchyard for the two-minute silence at 11am followed by a service in church.



This war memorial in St Mary's Chapel of the Nativity contains the names of 100 war dead – casualties of the First World War.

Among the names is **John (or Jack) Harrison**, who achieved fame as a Hull FC player. In 1915 he joined the East Yorkshire Regiment. In 1917 he was awarded the Military Cross for his actions in France. Three months later his platoon was on patrol in Oppy Wood when they were pinned down by machine gun fire. Jack charged at the guns, saving many of his comrades' lives, but losing his own. His body was never found. He was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross.

Also notable is the unusual inclusion in the list of a woman, **Sybil Lewis**. She trained as a nurse and midwife, then studied Medicine before setting up a medical practice in Hull. In 1915 she volunteered to work with the Red Cross in Serbia. The hospital was overrun by the enemy and she spent four months as a prisoner of war. She was released in February 1916 and returned home, but despite weakened health she went again to work with the Serbian army and civilian refugees in Macedonia before finally returning home in December 1917. She died in March 1918 after an illness which was deemed to be a result of her service abroad. She was awarded the Order of St Sava for her services to Serbia

The memorial dates to 1921. It was designed by Temple Moore & Moore. The design was by Leslie Moore with decoration by Charles Head. Leslie Moore also designed the churchyard cross, dated 1921.


